Our History

We Are Community is a not for profit organisation that helps to feed, clothe and support the homeless and underprivileged.

We Are Community was founded April in 2018 when a group of friends came together to give back to the community after all being involved in previous community projects.

From these simple beginnings and in just over a year and a half

We Are Community has grown into an organisation that provides **hundreds of meals** to the needy each week across the Macarthur. Our service areas include Liverpool, Busby the entire Macarthur region and the Wollondilly.

About Us

We Are Community provide meals, hampers, toiletries, blankets, swags and a variety of other service to the homeless and less fortunate. But the name says it all “We Are Community” We want to be involved where possible to assist our community the best we way we can.

We Are Community connects with a wide range of people who are experiencing varying degrees of homelessness, social disadvantage, isolation and loneliness. The people who use We Are Community services are not our clients, partners or customers – but they are our FRIENDS.

Homelessness can and does happen to anyone. While We Are Community friends are using our services, our volunteers have positive and non-judgmental conversations.

We Are Community meal service friends are provided with a main meal as well as a breakfast pack to take away and further assisted where possible with swags, sanitary packs, toiletries, clothing items, blankets, etc. We also seek to collaborate with other service providers in our areas of operation so as to enable cross-referral wherever there may be benefit to our friends.

Jimmy Barnes, Manu Feildel and Colin Fassnidge and many more have been an avid supporter of We Are Community throughout various services.

In addition to meal services, our recently established **Connect Plus** and **Suspended Kindness Cafe** programs are further providing for the growing numbers of homeless, destitute, impoverished and

underprivileged people in our community.

Connect Plus Program

Connect plus is a communications project to assist our friends that are without access to the internet to connect to vital services. We Are Community Connect Plus (WACCP) will provide free access to phones, tablets, laptops and printers that will be connected to Wi-Fi through our van

We want to introduce and encourage our friends to connect to social media, especially if they have never had a social media account or have been disconnected for some time. This would allow the homeless and less fortunate to connect with friends and family that they have been disconnected from for some time. This will allow them to re-establish a connection. We believe by reinstating that connection and

relationships can change their position in life and gives opportunity to change their circumstance in a positive way and reducing homelessness

WACCP provides charging stations and in some cases be able to provide handsets, sim cards and recharge vouchers.

WACCP is a great initiative and a way of reconnecting our friends to society, essential services and change their lives to create positive connections with dignity and empathy.

Suspended Kindness Café Program

When you come across a homeless person asking for money on the street, do you sometimes wish you could give more than just coins? Maybe a meal and a drink?

Kindness can come in many forms... so next time you're picking up food and drink at one of our Suspended Kindness Cafes, you have the opportunity to make a small gesture of kindness

Make someone's day by paying-it-forward so they too can enjoy a nice meal and beverage.

The concept is simple. When you pay a Beveridge, sandwich or burger forward you will get a small light weight round token to do with as you please to benefit those in need...



Supporters of the Suspended Kindness Café can choose to distribute them directly, or have the café donate them to dozens of community organizations to share amongst the people that need it the most.

We restore faith in humanity by highlighting the simple acts of kindness happening all around us and encouraging others to do the same.

Kindness can come in many forms, including the purchase of a suspended drink or meal, which is the very idea that inspired this movement. A suspended drink or meal is the advance purchase of a drink or a meal for someone who needs it, no matter why

STRUCTURE & MANAGEMENT

We Are Community are currently registered as an incorporated association in NSW, however we see a bright future with positive impact by expanding our Suspended Kindness Café and Connect Plus services Australia wide, whilst our food programs will remain in the Liverpool, Macarthur and Wollondilly regions over the next 5 years and beyond. This is important for us, so it allows us to expand not only our network but that of other partnerships to allow us all to help our friends make significant and positive changes in their lives. Being apart and sharing their success in affordable housing, cooking facilities, or facilities that permit adequate personal hygiene, e.g. laundry and showers. Importantly we want them to be able to access a network of other critical services such as family and personal counselling, gambling, alcohol and drug programs and mental health support services.

Our structure will be made up of volunteers, team leaders, area coordinators who will report to a five-member board which is made up of a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer and Public Officer. As we grow

And see the need for change the charity may need to look at employing some people to assist with Fundraising, Social Media, Administration, Finance, Human Resources, Marketing and other key roles to allow us the need for positive change.

Over this time, we will expand a range of services into new regions and regional centres across Australia and develop resources and processes which aid all services. As a charity, like many other charities we have some rules, regulations and boundaries we all need to follow It's important that volunteers never use their position with We Are Community for leverage or to promote their own thoughts, beliefs or decisions. Leaving personal agendas at the door enables volunteers to be mentally present on shift and fosters an environment where our friends feel safe to talk about their experiences without fear of judgment.

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT



I have been honoured to take on the role as Chairperson when voted in, back in November 2018, after Co-founder, Paul Mackin, stepped down due to personal reasons. Since that time the charity has really taken off in a very positive direction.

Not long after taking on the role, the charity was lucky to receive a new van as a donation in kind from our platinum sponsor BlueCHP Ltd. This allowed us to better serve the community for our services to the homeless and less fortunate. To complement this amazing donation the charity was successful in our first grant through our federal member Dr Mike Freeland which provided us \$10,000.00. This money went towards a fit out inside the van to allow us not only to transport meals to those in need through our night patrol service, but to also have storage for blankets and toiletries to hand out as required to those in need. The major part of this project was the connect plus program which allows us to provide free wi-fi, charge phones and have a wireless printer for the homeless and less fortunate. Being homeless but not having any type of connection to the outside world can be very stressful with a total disconnect from vital service. We Are Community wanted to change that by putting the wi-fi and other components in the van. Over time many of our friends have taken advantage of these facilities.

The first month was extremely busy and We Are Community welcomed a very special guest, celebrity chef Manu Feildel from MKR. Manu is a personal family friend and when contacted to come out to assist, he didn't hesitate. Manu has shown his support for some time and is an advocate for many amazing organisations and charities and has always be very kind in giving his time to help others.

Throughout 2019 the board have been working hard to implement new Policies and Procedures to provide a better and sound structure for our volunteers, sponsors and the community. This allowed us to have a stronger strategic direction and allowed us to start a new fortnightly lunch service in Busby with the Salvation Army on a Sunday.

One of our biggest challenges is to attract volunteers to the charity and we have been on an ongoing drive to do so. This has been very difficult at times with several shortages at various services over the period. The board has worked hard to change that position and I am pleased to say we are now starting to see a positive increase to volunteer numbers.

Throughout 2019 We Are Community brought on some very exciting sponsors. Having sponsors is such an integral part of our charity, this allows us access to imperative services, product and financial backing. This year to date I'm pleased to announce we joined forces with My Muscle Chef, who are providing healthy nutritional meals which provides us in over 90% of our meals for night patrol and a financial component. The financial and meal package is worth well over a massive \$90k per annum! Another important sponsor is that of ColdREX. ColdREX is a refrigeration transport and storage business in Smithfield who provide services to the east coast and regional VIC, NSW and QLD. Brendan Donnelly, the CEO of ColdREX, has been very supportive right from the start and provided We Are Community a financial injection of over \$9,000 annually. We are also proud of our new partnerships with Bid for You, who is assisting us with grants and Just Cuts Macarthur Square, providing haircuts to the less fortunate through our monthly Sunday Roast Dinner Service.

We Are Community have had a very busy couple of months leading up to our AGM. We conducted our very own street count. The results of our street count were;

- Rough Sleepers – 14
- Temporary Accommodation – 23
- Others being assisted with other agencies – 11

The figures are very concerning, and on all accounts can see an increase to figures that have been previously available through census, local media and other organisations reporting based on their own data collections. Going forward we intend to run another street counts that will include areas such as Camden LGA, Minto and Ingleburn. 1 in 200 people are homeless in Australia and that figure relates as an overall 116,000 + in which 8,000 sleep rough every night. We are only 2 years out from the next census count and unfortunately that figure will be sure to increase.

We Are Community hosted Jane and Jimmy Barnes at one of our Sunday night roast dinner services and everyone of our friends were excited to have the Aussie rock legend serve them dinner. Jane and Jimmy gave up time to chat with those doing it tough and we were all so very grateful to have them join our little charity. October 10 was world homeless day and We Are Community put on a fundraiser to raise awareness at Bar Centrale. This fundraiser was organised through Janeen Harris from Neenish Arts and Sandie O'Neill from Licence to Create and the ladies did an amazing job. We had many special guests including the Mayor and our all-time-favourite Chef, Manu Feildel, who cooked up a storm.

It has been an amazing year and I have been very grateful to lead such an amazing team, our volunteers have been the backbone of our charity and each and everyone that has volunteered either once off or ongoing, have made us what we are today, I'm excited to see where the future will take us in being an integral part of those doing it so tough, allowing us to return dignity and assisting to end homelessness one person at a time.

OUR OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

We Are Community objectives going forward are to have a base to work from. Currently many of our storage and administration operations are run from our homes and this restricts us in so many ways. Going forward we are looking to be operating from a community centre or office space to allow us to better serve our community and make it easier for our volunteers. There are plans currently in place to make this possible and are working closely with our sponsor BlueCHP Ltd to make this a reality.

We also are looking to put on a refrigerated van and another two-night patrol vans. As you know the Macarthur / Wollondilly is such a huge area and we want to be able to assist those doing it tough much easier. Currently we are using our own vehicles to service the greater Macarthur and Wollondilly areas. A refrigerated vehicle would allow us to provide a much-needed food rescue service to the Macarthur. Food rescue is already happening in the area through Oz Harvest however all food is taken from the area back to their city base before it's re distributed. We believe we can provide the same service but at a much faster pace being able to not only assisting those in need but other agencies and keeping the food where it belongs.

The financial statements cover We Are Community Incorporated as an individual entity. We Are Community Incorporated is a not-for-profit association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 ('the Act').

The principal activity of the association for the year ended 30 June 2019 is:

Services to assist the homeless in the Macarthur region.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of preparation

In the opinion of the Committee of Management, the association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

2 Summary of significant accounting policies

Income tax

The association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated reliably then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Revenue from training services is generally recognised once the training has been delivered.

Interest revenue

Interest is recognised using the effective interest method.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period, the association determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where this indicator exists and regardless for goodwill, indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the assets is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss, except for goodwill.
